## HTeaO TO OPEN ITS FIRST LOCATION IN THE AREA

HTeaO will soon become the newest addition to the Gardner community's beverage scene. This Texas-based chain has more than 100 locations across the country, with Gardner's serving as the first on the Kansas side of the metro. The 2,100-square-foot building will be located at 838 E. Main St., offering a vast selection of sweetened and unsweetened tea flavors such as Georgia peach, wild raspberry, blueberry green, and more. Alongside tea offerings, the business serves coffee and other brewed products. Snacks and water are also available for purchase. Additionally, the city council recently approved a rezoning application for a mixed-use development on the southeast corner of 175th and Clare Road called Clare Crossing. # REVITALIZING LANDSCAPES: SUSTAINABLE SOLUTIONS REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

The City of Gardner's Stormwater Cost Share Program encourages residents and business owners to integrate stormwater management strategies on their properties, thereby reducing stormwater runoff and pollution, improving water quality, and providing natural habitats for wildlife.

In partnership with Johnson County, the city allocates funds for this program to offset the costs of stormwater management projects that capture, slow down, or absorb stormwater at its source. Methods could include rain gardens, native plantings, and rain barrels. The program can reimburse up to 50% of installation and material costs. Funding is available on a first-come, first-served basis and contingent upon approval from the Public Works Department. Projects mandated to meet stormwater treatment requirements outlined in the city's building and construction code are ineligible for funding. Applicants are responsible for ensuring compliance with city ordinances and meeting any homeowner association requirements, if applicable.

#### CARBON MONOXIDE SAFETY

Often referred to as the silent killer, carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas formed from the incomplete combustion of various fuels, including gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil and methane. Even small amounts of CO can pose a serious threat to health over prolonged exposure, while larger amounts can lead to acute poisoning in a shorter period. In 2010 alone, U.S. fire departments handled approximately 80,100 non-fire CO incidents, averaging about nine calls per hour. It's crucial to familiarize yourself with the following information to ensure your and your family's safety from CO poisoning.

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area on every level of the home and in other places where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the house. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting
- Choose a CO alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel declare it safe to re-enter the house.

- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Ensure a running vehicle's exhaust pipe is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- · A generator should be used outdoors, away from windows, doors, and vent openings, in a well-ventilated location.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO but should only be used outside.
- Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

# **GARDNER JUSTICE CENTER** SERVES AS TORNADO SHELTER



While April through June is considered tornado season in Kansas, tornadoes can occur at any time. That's why we want to remind the public that the Gardner Justice Center, 16540 N. Moonlight Road, serves as a tornado shelter for those without a safe place to go when tornadic weather strikes. The Justice Center is open for tornado warnings ONLY, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. If a tornado warning occurs outside of business hours, the Gardner Justice Center will become available as soon as an officer reports back to the building. Pets are welcome; however, individuals with pets will be separated from those without pets due to others who may be allergic or afraid of animals.



#### **2024 SEASON POOL PASSES**

Pool passes are available for purchase at City Hall. All new pool members are required to take a photo. Membership photos can only be taken at City Hall, 120 E. Main St. Existing members can use their previous photo and will be asked to update as needed. A barcode will be printed on your receipt. We encourage pool members to take a picture of the barcode so that it can be scanned from their phone at the admissions entrance. Cost of passes is as follows: Family/\$160.00, Adults/\$85.00, and Youth and Nanny/\$70.00.
