

POLICE CHIEF HIGHLIGHTS IMPORTANCE OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

With just a little over a year under her belt as Gardner's chief of police, Pam Waldeck has led the implementation of several key strategies to enhance the Gardner Police Department's (GPD) performance and service to the city.

Among them, Chief Waldeck believes increased community involvement is one of the most significant efforts the department has made. "We want our residents to feel secure in the knowledge that they can rely on their police officers and that the GPD always has the best interests of its community members at heart," she stated. "With more interaction with the public, trust is established, crime rates decrease, and community members are confident they will receive the necessary assistance."

Last year, GPD participated in 41 community engagement activities, ranging from large events to small gatherings, such as the Citizens Police Academy, Teenage Driving Academy and Coffee with a Cop. "Our goal is to connect with everyone of all ages, interests and lifestyles," Chief Waldeck said. "We want all to know that we are here to serve them, that they can trust the department's character, and that they play a part in keeping the city safe."

Chief Waldeck emphasizes that one of the best ways for residents to reciprocate and play an active role in keeping the community safe is by creating a Neighborhood Watch Program. This highly successful program encourages volunteering residents to collaborate with law enforcement to prevent crime and improve disaster preparedness. Examples of this include keeping an eye out for neighbors on vacation, enhancing individual and neighborhood emergency preparedness levels, and learning how to report suspicious activity effectively. "This popular and proven program has been around for years," Chief Waldeck noted. "As Gardner continues to grow, it will

be even more important for community members to get involved to keep Gardner one of the safest cities in Kansas as it stands today."

Faith Jolly, the new Community Policing Officer for the GPD, serves as a partner and liaison between the community and the

department. She will help strengthen partnerships between law enforcement, residents and other stakeholders, enhancing safety through collaborative crime prevention efforts. Chief Waldeck encourages community members



interested in starting a Neighborhood Watch Program or involving the department in an event to contact Officer Jolly.

"The Gardner Police Department is not only enhancing its operational efficiency but also building a foundation of trust and cooperation with the community it serves. By prioritizing public engagement, we are ensuring that the GPD remains a reliable and integral part of our city, and Gardner remains a safe place to live, work and play," said Chief Pam Waldeck.

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FIREWORKS DATES, RULES AND SAFETY TIPS

Independence Day is approaching, and many Gardner residents will choose to celebrate with legal fireworks within our city limits. The sale or distribution of fireworks is permitted between June 28 and July 4. As a reminder, they can only be discharged from July 2 through July 4, between 10 a.m. and 11 p.m. To ensure the safe and responsible use of these fireworks, please remember the following details:

- You may not discharge fireworks on any public property within the city, including public streets and sidewalks. City code violations can result in a fine and the confiscation of the fireworks by any member of the police and fire departments.
- Fireworks should be used cautiously, only in the intended manner, and always under close adult supervision.
- Always keep water nearby to extinguish small residual flames that may create a fire hazard.
- Don't forget our citizens with PTSD, autism, and other sensory challenges. Be considerate of them as you plan when and where to discharge fireworks.
- Remember our furry family members, too. Pets can fear fireworks and try to run from them, escaping fences or pulling free from leashes. Keep them safe, secure and out of harm's way.
- Respect your neighbors and your city by cleaning up firework debris. You are responsible for ensuring that your mess does not spread to neighboring public or private property.
- Obey all city and state laws governing the discharge of fireworks. Gardner police officers will be prepared to issue citations to those who violate the fireworks ordinance.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY AROUND SWIMMING POOLS, HOT TUBS & SPAS



For many of us, water activities equal fun. But it's important to be aware of electrical hazards while enjoying the water. Know how to be safe around swimming pools, hot tubs and spas.

- If you are putting in a new pool, hot tub or spa, be sure the wiring is performed by an electrician experienced in the special safety requirements for these types of
- Outdoor receptacles must have covers that keep them dry even when appliances are plugged into them.
- Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) are special devices designed to protect against electric shock and electrocution. They are required for most pool, spa or hot tub equipment. They may be in the form of an outlet or a circuit breaker. Test the GFCIs monthly according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Electrical appliances, equipment and cords should be kept at least 6 feet from the water. When possible, use battery-operated appliances and equipment, such as televisions, radios and stereos.

- · Avoid handling electrical devices when you are wet.
- · Make sure that any overhead lines maintain the proper distance over a pool and other structures, such as a diving board. If unsure, contact a qualified electrician or your local utility company to make sure power lines are a safe distance away.
- · Do not swim during a thunderstorm.
- Have a qualified electrician periodically inspect and—where necessary—replace or upgrade the electrical devices or equipment that keep your pool, spa, or hot tub electrically safe.
- Have a qualified electrician show you how to turn off all power in case of an emergency.

KNOW THE RISKS: Electrocution is death by an electrical shock. Be aware when skin is wet or when surrounding surfaces, such as the grass or pool deck, are wet. Wet skin or wet surfaces can greatly increase the chance of electrocution when electricity is present.

There are several signs of electrical shock. Swimmers may feel a tingling sensation. They may experience muscle cramps. They may not be able to move. They may feel as if something is holding them in place. If you think someone in the water is being shocked, turn off all power, but do not attempt to go in the water. Use a fiberglass or other kind of rescue hook that doesn't conduct electricity to help the swimmer. Have someone call 9-1-1.

If you think you are being shocked while in the water, move away from the source of the shock. Get out of the water.

2024 WATER QUALITY REPORT NOW AVAILABLE

The City of Gardner's 2024 Consumer Confidence Report on water quality is now available at gardnerkansas.gov/waterqualityreport2024. The city offers this annual report to assure citizens that the public water system provides safe, clean and dependable water according to state and federal regulations. The report covers the previous calendar year and includes water quality data, such as water sources and sample testing results. Results show that the city continues to meet standards for water quality in accordance with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment and Environmental Protection Agency guidelines.
