U.S. 56/ MAIN STREET ROAD IMPROVEMENTS TO BEGIN 2021


Significant road improvements are coming to U.S. 56/Main Street next year. These improvements come after the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) awarded the City of Gardner \$3,000,000 in funding for pavement restoration of the highway from Sycamore Street to Old 56 Highway. The project, which stretches nearly a mile long, includes pavement reconstruction, removal and replacement of curb and gutter, driveway and sidewalk enhancements, and other related infrastructure work.

As identified in the Capital Improvement Plan, the city will provide matching funds to cover the design, utility relocation, and construction. The city's portion will come from bonds paid through the Special Highway Fund.

"We have thousands of commuters on this roadway every day, so this is a much-needed improvement project," said Michael Kramer, public works director. "For many, this roadway provides the first impression of Gardner, so making it more aesthetically appealing is also important."

U.S. 56/Main Street is categorized as a "City Connecting Link," which is defined as any routing of the State Highway System located within the corporate limits of a city. The city applied for funds for this project through KDOT's City Connecting Link Improvement Program (CCLIP). The CCLIP





While the city is working with KDOT to improve U.S. 56/Main Street, KDOT will continue to provide maintenance to the roadway, including snow and ice removal, sweeping and pothole repairs. CULVER'S IS HEADED TO GARDNER!

Gardner will soon have another dining option with the addition of a new Culver's. The quick-service, family-style restaurant will sit north of I-35 along the west side of Gardner Road between Phillips 66 and QuikTrip. This popular chain specializes in burgers, frozen custard shakes/concretes and Wisconsin-style cheese curds. The scope of the restaurant includes a 4,330 square-foot building



with dine-in seating for 95, a 30-seat patio, a drive-through, and takeout service. Construction is slated to begin this fall with plans to open by summer 2021.





During this anything-but-normal summer, some normality is beginning to return to our fair city. Schools are reopening district-wide on Sept. 9. We finalized the budget and Capital Improvement Plans for 2021 and 2022. And, we are seeing more construction going forward on our road network, as well as on the Plaza South property near 188th Street and Gardner Road, and at the Waverly Plaza development at Waverly Road and West Santa Fe Street.

1) Complete the 2020 Census if you have not already. Having an accurate and complete count is vitally important to our city, from federal/state funding and granting decisions to whether developers choose to come to Gardner with commercial and retail offerings.

2) Please check on your neighbors from time to time. Financial and psychological stress during this pandemic is a real thing. And part of the #GardnerStrong character of our community is our willingness to have each other's backs and help our fellow citizens in need. Check with City Hall if you want to be connected with resources that can help keep our community healthy.

SPINNING EARTH GALLERY & SACRED SPACES YOGA AND PILATES

VEHICLE FIRE SAFETY - MUST DO'S

No one ever expects their car to catch on fire, but it happens more often than one thinks. According to the U.S. Fire Administration, it's estimated that 171,500 highway fires occur across the United States every year. This includes fires in passenger vehicles, freight road transport vehicles, and agricultural or construction vehicles.



Should one's vehicle catch on fire, it is important to act quickly using the following steps:

Pull over as quickly as you can when it is safe.

Once you have stopped, turn off the engine.

Get everyone out of the vehicle. Never return to a burning vehicle. Do not try to fight the fire yourself.

If you think there is a fire under the hood or trunk, do not open it. This could cause the fire to grow.

Move everyone at least 100 feet from the burning car and well away from traffic.

Call 911.

To prevent a vehicle fire, take the following measures:

Have your car regularly serviced by a trained mechanic.

Keep gas cans or propane tanks away from passengers. Tightly seal and place them on a flat surface to make sure they stay upright.

Keep windows open to stop fumes from building up if you must put gas cans or propane tanks inside your vehicle.

Drive safely to avoid an accident.

SMART METER INSTALLATION PROJECT UNDERWAY

Over the next several months, the city will provide smart meters to all its utility customers. This advanced metering infrastructure records electricity and water consumption and communicates this usage data directly to the city for monitoring and billing. The meters also lead to cost savings through consumption management by customers. NexGen will serve as the installer. Installers, who are identifiable by a NexGen vehicle and a City of Gardner/NexGen partnership badge, will attempt to alert customers by knocking on their doors or ringing their doorbells before replacing their meters. Customers should expect a brief service disruption during the time of installation. CENSUS TAKERS START HOME VISITS

Enumerators have hit the streets and are headed to the homes of every Gardner resident who has yet to respond to the 2020 Census on their own. Currently, Gardner has a 74.8 percent self-response rate compared to Johnson County's overall response rate of 76.9 percent. The enumerators will help increase those numbers by assisting with data collection, which will determine funding for services and infrastructure in the community and political representation.

In the wake of the pandemic, all census takers have been given protective equipment for their personal use and have been trained on social distancing protocols as they manually gather census data. Households that have not received a personal visit still have an opportunity to complete the census online, by phone or mail. Those responding to it can do so in English or 12 other languages.
