#### POLICE CHIEF JAY BELCHER: MY BATTLE WITH COVID-19

Oct. 10 started as a typical Saturday morning for Gardner Police Chief Jay Belcher - breakfast with the family, morning chores, and preparation to leave for his youngest son's sporting event. Little did Jay know that this day is when he would begin his personal battle with COVID-19.

"I was watching my son's game that afternoon, and I suddenly started to feel ill, but I just thought it was my heart giving me trouble as I've had cardiac issues in the past," Jay shared. "I kept an even greater distance from people to be on the safe side, but I really wasn't worried that I was dealing with the virus."

Jay admits that his skepticism about the virus was the reason for his lack of concern that it was the culprit behind his declining health. "There have been so many mixed messages surrounding the pandemic, and sometimes it's hard to decipher between what's fact or fiction," Jay said. "Plus, everyone that I knew that contracted it only experienced minor symptoms."

Jay's views immediately changed that day. By evening, he experienced full-blown symptoms, including body aches, chills, nausea, severe chest burning, a cough, and a high fever of 102.4. But, one particular symptom signaled to Jay that he wasn't dealing with your average flu. "My wife served pizza that night for dinner, and I couldn't smell or taste it. That's when I knew I had likely contracted the virus," Jay said.



On Oct. 12, Jay's suspicions were confirmed when he received the results that he had tested positive for COVID-19. Jay immediately contacted his doctor who wanted to admit him to the hospital. Jay declined and wanted to try to ride it out in his home. "Over time, my symptoms intensified to the point that I thought I was going to have to go to the hospital regardless. I prepared my wife that I'm likely going to be fighting for my life once I go."

Jay's doctor set up daily virtual meetings to monitor his heart and symptoms as he took the prescribed medications. Jay also had to purchase special medical equipment to monitor his breathing and heart. After a hard-fought battle, sometime between Oct. 19 and Oct. 21, Jay started to see improvement in his health. "It was a grueling 10 to 12 days, worse than anything I've ever experienced with the flu, but thankfully, I got through it," Jay expressed. "So far, there doesn't seem to be any serious after effects, but I have yet to gain back my ability to taste and smell."

Jay felt compelled to share his story to help others understand that this virus can severely impact people. "I just don't want anyone else to go through what I went through. I'm 48 years old, and even though I had some prior health challenges, I still didn't think it would be a big deal if I did get COVID," he admitted. "I want people to do whatever they can to take care of themselves because you don't know if you're going to be that one individual who ends up fighting for your life should you contract it."

Jay has been a member of the Gardner Police Department since 1998 and has served as Chief of Police since July 2019.

Throw away light strands with frayed or pinched wires. 2) Water your Christmas tree every day. A dry tree is dangerous because it can easily catch on fire. 3) Consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell, and feel like real candles. 4) If you use lit candles, make sure they are in stable holders and place them where they cannot be knocked down easily.
